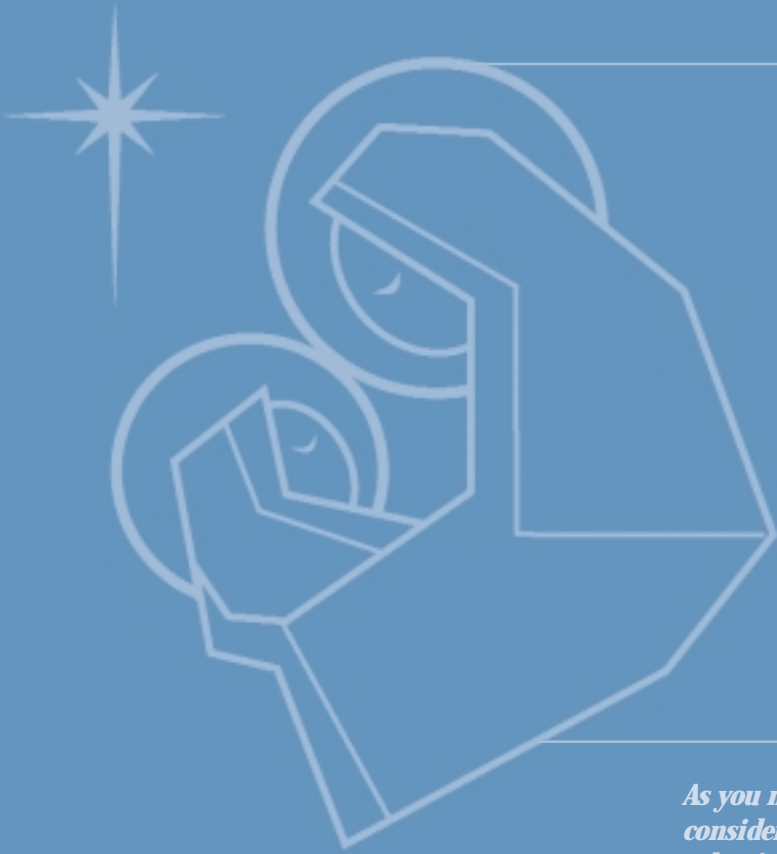

I share these verses with you because they exemplify the heart of PSI's student body. Each of the 240 men and women currently enrolled at PSI has made the decision to give his or her life in service to others. They've sacrificed their time, talents and finances to help others heal emotionally and spiritually. They've dedicated their lives to making a real difference, helping hurting people reengage in the world and, most important, connect with their Creator.

It's an honor for me and the faculty and staff of PSI to help our students prepare for their ministries of service. In fact, one of our main development goals for 2005 is to increase scholarships and other forms of assistance to ensure that anyone who feels called to PSI has the resources to respond to that calling.

Some students will end up borrowing \$40,000 to cover the cost of their education at PSI. The average salary for a master's-level clinician just out of graduate school is \$40,000, so you can see that new scholarships and financial aid would lower the amount of debt our students may have to incur.

New funding would be particularly helpful in light of the fact that we had to raise tuition for the first time in two years. However, PSI is still the most affordable of all comparable programs in the country. And we're producing the best and brightest counselors and marriage and family therapists. Our first class under full accreditation to take the National Counselor Examination scored in the top 19 percent nationally.

Please keep us in your prayers as we seek to provide for those who desire to be part of our unique program, which integrates the tools of psychology with the power of Christian faith to help those struggling with mental health issues. As we approach the year's end and you look for worthy charities to support, we ask you to consider PSI, knowing that your gift can influence generations of difference-makers to come.

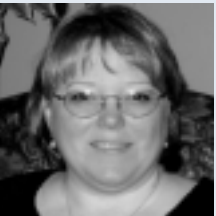

Difference-Making 101



PSI welcomes **Dr. Lynne Harris** as assistant professor of psychology and counseling and assistant dean of students. Lynne is a licensed psychologist with a Ph.D. in counseling psychology from the University of Southern Mississippi.

She comes to PSI from the University of Tennessee

Student Counseling Center in Knoxville, where she provided therapy for students, consulted with faculty and staff, and supervised doctoral students and interns in their clinical training.

PSI enrolled 90 new students for the fall semester. An orientation was held at each campus in August to introduce new students to faculty and staff and answer their questions as they prepared to start classes. Our total enrollment for the 2004-05 academic year is 240.

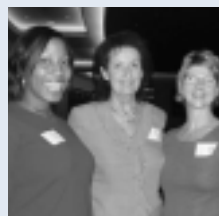


PSI students, faculty and staff converged on Red Top Mountain State Park in north Georgia for a picnic to celebrate the start of the new school year.

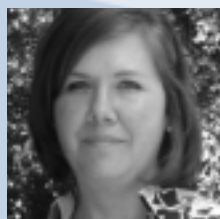
The **CBI Counseling Center**, the largest in PSI's network of counseling centers, is offering a new intensive outpatient program (IOP) for drug and alcohol addiction recovery. It uses the 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous combined with Biblical teaching to facilitate permanent lifestyle change

through the healing of damaged emotions. The IOP is based on the belief that God desires restoration for our bodies and souls, which can be achieved by reconnecting with our spiritual sides as opposed to filling life voids with mood-altering substances. Treatment includes psycho-educational groups to provide an understanding of addiction and the recovery process; group therapy for peer support and spiritual growth; and family involvement and therapy as appropriate. **Dr. Casey Tiggleman**, who has more than 30 years of clinical experience, serves as the program's coordinator.

Dr. Tim Sisemore, PSI's dean of clinical activities, has published *I Bet...I Won't Fret!*, a workbook of exercises children can do with their parents or in therapy to work through generalized anxiety disorders or excessive worry. Anxiety is the most common childhood emotional disorder with studies suggesting 10 to 20 percent of children are affected by it. However, anxious children typically aren't disruptive, so they aren't referred to counseling often. The workbook, part of an Instant Help Books™ series, draws on scientifically proven methods for dealing with childhood anxiety and uses them in the form of fun and compelling activities to teach kids how to practice emotional and behavioral skills to overcome anxious thoughts and feelings. 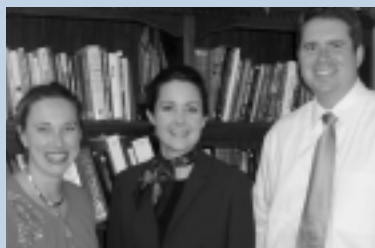
Dr. Sisemore and PSI alums **Katherine Jonas** and **Wendy Norwood** contributed to *Children's Spirituality: Christian Perspectives, Research and Applications*, a new text that explores the spiritual development and experiences of children. The chapter Katherine and Wendy co-authored explores how children use faith to cope with life stresses, particularly chronic illness and parental divorce. They suggest that Christian faith is more of a resource for children than counselors often think. Dr. Sisemore's chapter traces church history to show that a proper understanding of the doctrine of original sin leads to a parenting style high in structure and nurture – the style current psychological research supports.



'96 Rebecca G. Palpant, M.S., is assistant program coordinator for the Rosalynn Carter Fellowships for Mental Health Journalism at The Carter Center in Atlanta. This is the main anti-stigma effort of the Carter Center's Mental Health Program, designed to educate working journalists about mental health issues so they can report on the subject accurately. After graduating from PSI, Rebecca worked as an assessment counselor for Rapha. After three years there, she took some time away from the field and was diagnosed with cancer soon thereafter. The cancer is now in remission. Rebecca says, "What didn't make sense then makes total sense now." She explains that had she not had cancer, she wouldn't have realized her real dreams. "I've always had a passion for writing, but I didn't know how that would fit with my interest in psychology and counseling," she says. During her recovery, Rebecca volunteered at The Carter Center. She began working there full time a few months later, promoting what is the only program in mental health journalism. She gets to work closely with Mrs. Carter, who has been a leader in mental health reform since her husband campaigned for the Georgia governorship in the early 1970s. "I feel like I'm having a real impact because of the work I do," Rebecca notes. "Journalists are powerful resources within society, and they can have a profound effect – many policy and program changes have already occurred," she says. "I'm grateful to get to use all the diverse tools within my toolbox. I'm definitely within my bliss."

'97 Rebecca Hill, Denise Horner and

Jim Milner are founding partners of Wellsprings Counseling Group in Morristown, Tenn. Denise and Becca were friends before coming to PSI and had a vision of returning to their native East Tennessee to start a practice. The "Tennessee Twins," as they were called, felt led to recruit fellow classmate Jim, a native Atlantan, to join them in starting a practice that would provide a full spectrum of Christian counseling services to a community much in need. With business advice from Becca's husband, Monte, the dream became a reality much faster than anyone imagined. Within the charming house where the Wellsprings Group is located is a special room with walls covered in Bible verses. Proverbs 4:23 if one of the most prominent and was the inspiration for the name of the practice: "Above all else, guard your heart, for it is the wellspring of life." Jim explains that the practice is more than just a business. "I've experienced God's faithfulness in pursuing me, and I continue to learn to trust him and love people on a deeper level," he says. Denise agrees, "We expected to minister to our clients, to offer them our services, but I don't think we realized how much God would grow us and mold us in the process." Becca adds, "We love what we do, but being counselors comes with costs, and we've all been enlightened about the reality of spiritual warfare." To encourage one another as friends and hold each other accountable as professionals, the three partners meet regularly to pray for protection and guidance. They credit PSI for enabling them to be mentored by "model" therapists and supervisors during their time in the program. Becca, Denise and Jim followed their passion and are truly making a difference.
